

>75%

of homeless youth will have contact with the police >50%



Purpose of Scoping Review



Three Animating Questions:

- 1) What is the state of the literature regarding the impact of youth housing instability and justice system involvement as determinants of one another?
- 2) What are the theoretical frameworks informing this research?
- 3) What implications do these findings hold for the next generation of juvenile justice-focused interventions?

Methods



Databases

PubMed Web of Science Academic Search Complete Google Scholar

Search Terms

Search results returned:

2,154 titles

75 met eligibility for inclusion33 of 75 abstracts met eligibility criteria

7 additional publications identified from 584 citing papers40 texts under full review

28 articles included in this scoping review



General Characteristics of Existing Literature:

 \triangleright Quantitative (17/28 studies)

 \succ Cross-Sectional (11/17 quantitative studies)

- ➢ Focuses on risk-based epidemiological factors (16/28)
- \blacktriangleright Missing reviews (1/28) & theory-driven publications (1/28)



Direction of Effects:

1) Housing instability as a predictor of justice system contact

2) Justice system involvement as a predictor of housing instability

3) Co-occurring housing instability and justice system contact



1) Housing instability as a predictor of justice system contact

- ➢ Greatest representation overall (18/28 studies)
- Disproportionately focused on experience of

actively homeless youth (12/18)

- \triangleright Overwhelmingly quantitative in methodology (14/18)
- > Thematic emphasis on proximal risk factors (e.g., survival behaviors)



2) Justice system involvement as a predictor of housing instability

- > Minimal representation overall (4/28 studies)
 - \blacktriangleright Actively homeless youth with prior justice contact (2/4)
 - \blacktriangleright Highlight youth exiting justice system (2/4)
- Thematic emphasis on structural and psycho-social barriers to housing stability created by system involvement



3) Co-occurring housing instability and justice system contact

- ► Low/moderate representation overall (6/28 studies)
- Focused on experience of actively homeless youth (5/6)
- Thematic emphasis: punitive law enforcement response to survival behaviors, rather linking youth to community services

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Summary & Future Directions



Literature overwhelmingly:



- Cross-sectional
- Focused on risk behaviors
- Actively homeless youth
- Lacking in application of theoretical frameworks
- Zero engagement of social determinants



- Need more encompassing frameworks & cross-system partnerships
 - > Potential for interdisciplinary collaboration between criminology and public health
 - > Applying a social determinants lens \rightarrow upstream engagement
 - Potential to shift justice response to community-based services response
- Hope: youth linked to post-exit housing options and relevant social services were more likely to obtain stable housing and avoid future contact with the justice system.
- Interventions at the system level hold promise for reducing youth homelessness for those in contact with the justice system

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
